Stories. They tie us together – across experiences, across cultures, across the everyday and the extraordinary. They link us to our past. They define our present. They stir hope for our future. I'm amazed by the many powerful stories Community Housing & Resources has helped create over the past year due to the staunch dedication of CHR's staff, board, volunteers and supporters.

Renewal is the theme of these stories. Hurricane Ian wiped out 11 of our 76 units in September 2022. Two years on, we've repaired or rebuilt all but Riverview. Residents who were displaced yet determined to return are back. At the same time, we keep on serving others, whether newcomers or long-time workers, who need affordable housing and a place to call home.

This theme also drove our announcement that CHR would ensure at least 100 affordable units on-island by 2029-starting with building an all-new, uniquely designed Riverview on Periwinkle Way. That \$7 million facility will consist of 10 one-bedroom units plus eight ensuite units, a creative way to create essential housing by offering both private and common living space.

CHR was among those living into the renewal theme, eager to do more and be more in our community. We moved into new offices at 2340 Periwinkle Way, Suite K-2, smack in the beating heart of the village shops. Savannah Miller-Berg, our Deputy Executive Director, expanded her community reach as part of the SWFL Leadership Class. In that same spirit, Savannah and I jointly presented with local leaders at the Florida Housing Coalition's annual conference, encouraging attendees to reimagine affordable housing.

Of course, these stories couldn't be told without the generosity of the people who give their time and treasure to CHR. As we kicked off a capital campaign for the new Riverview last spring, donors pledged \$3 million to get us started. In February, more than 250 donors came together for the Give Your Heart to CHR Gallery Gala, bidding on 15 heart-shaped sculptures assembled by 16 local artists to help fund the critical work of CHR. And of course, we continue to depend on the daily gifts from caring donors and volunteers eager to make a difference.

Telling these many stories in compelling ways led CHR to launch a series of print and online articles spotlighting our residents. Their experiences are personal, inspiring and real-so much so that the Florida Housing Coalition awarded CHR its coveted Storytellers Award this year. Also, I was touched and honored to be named SWFL Citizen of the Year, which I see as a testament to the dedication of the entire CHR team.

Like any storyteller, I could go on. The pages of this report will give you a deeper view of the impact CHR and our supporters have in people's lives. By providing safe, quality, affordable housing for those who work and serve our islands, we are co-authors as they create their own tales of transformation.

None of that would happen without you. Your support and partnership make CHR more than storytellers. Together with you, we're helping others create and share their own stories of home! Let's keep making every story a good one.

Neil Erickson calls his experience with Community Housing & Resources "life-changing." Now he and his family are doing their part to help CHR change the lives of others. "My three sons are in Boy Scouts, and I'm the assistant scoutmaster. We do a lot of volunteer work for CHR," said Neil.

If you show up at a CHR event, chances are you'll see Neil, his sons and their fellow Scouts helping out. "It's all about giving back to an organization and a community that means so much to us," he explained.

Neil moved from northern Minnesota to Florida in 1994, eventually settling in Sanibel. Impressed with its friendly, small-town feel, he took a job with The Island Water Association, Inc. Soon his family outgrew their small rental, and they relocated to Cape Coral. That meant years of tough daily commutes, sometimes up to two hours.

No surprise, then, that they were eager to return to Sanibel. The family turned to CHR, which offers resources for affordable housing to full-time island workers who meet income guidelines. Through CHR's Limited Equity Ownership option, *they found a new home, and a new life, with the close-knit community at a CHR property.*

"It's a wonderful island community. It's friendly, safe, and feels like a small town. The school system is excellent. We love the bike paths and the nature preserves," Neil said.

"CHR offers a great place to live an outstanding life. It's been an amazing experience for our family... life-changing, you'd say!"



Community Housing & Resources has proudly served our island workforce and older adults for 45 years. Founded in 1979 – the first program of its kind in the state of Florida – CHR is the below market rate housing authority for the City of Sanibel.

As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, CHR provides affordable rental housing to those who work at least 35 hours a week at a Sanibel-located business or Sanibel-based business on Captiva, and to older adults of the island communities. Rent is based on 30% of a household's annual income.

CHR started with 5 units on Beach Rd which are still standing and in use. Today CHR has 65 rental units after losing 11 to Hurricane Ian. But there still isn't enough affordable housing to meet the need.

Sanibel's economy has long-depended on the hundreds of diverse and dedicated people who provide services to the islands. Everyone benefits when the workforce lives in the community and participates in schools, organizations, churches and events. Yet retail workers, service staff, teachers, first responders and others may not earn enough for a place to call home.

CHR's goal is to have 100 affordable units available by 2029. The new Riverview will be a big step toward that goal.

- CHR is building a new affordable housing facility at 1517 Periwinkle Way to replace the former Riverview destroyed by Hurricane Ian
- The new Riverview will consist of two buildings: 10 one bed/
 one bath apartments (6,000 SF total, plus ground-level parking);
 and 8 new ensuites where residents have their own bedroom
 and bathroom while sharing a kitchen and living space
 (3,484 SF total, plus ground-level parking); with housing costs
 higher on island, this new option offers maximum affordability
- Riverview will be ADA-compliant; meet new building requirements that mandate elevated properties; and built to Florida Green Building and resiliency standards
- Targeted residents: very-low-to-moderate-income and/or entry-level workers employed by Sanibel-based businesses, and older adults
- COST: \$7 million COMPLETION: by end of 2025

In the Sanibel/Captiva area, 80% of female-single-parent families fall below the **ALICE** (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) threshold, a measure of financial stability.

For Jessica Baker, that's more than a statistic. Jessica works as a server in a local restaurant. She enjoys the job, the people and community. But when divorce left her coping as a single mom with two kids, the financial toll proved daunting. "I needed to find a new, affordable home," said Jessica.

She'd been commuting to Sanibel from Cape Coral. Transportation costs and hours on the road piled onto a stressful time. "I knew about CHR and how they help families. I decided to apply and see if we could qualify."

They did. Jessica and her family now live at a lovely CHR property. "It's a very welcoming, family-oriented neighborhood. The rent is much more affordable, and it's just five minutes from my job!" she said.

RAY'S STORY Florida weather makes it easy to commute on two wheels most of the time; Florida traffic, not so much.

That's just one reason Ray Barr

says CHR has been a lifesaver.

Ray fell in love with Sanibel after leaving Maine in 2004. He worked several jobs over the years, taking on roommates to keep his island rent within reach. When Hurricane Ian wiped out so many rentals, including Ray's, island living was no longer an option.

He moved to Fort Myers and rode his motor scooter to and from work on Sanibel – a dangerous gamble on busy *roads.* Ray longed to return to living on island, but as an hourly restaurant worker, he simply couldn't afford the growing costs.

Ray had heard of CHR, but didn't think they'd have anything for him. "Then I learned CHR puts special emphasis on helping island workers, because workers make Sanibel go. So affordable housing really could be a possibility for me! Applying was the best thing I could have done.

"CHR saved my life."

It's really become home," Ray said.

For Patty McIver, saying *Hurricane* lan left people shell-shocked is no overstatement. That includes herself and her closest family. Patty, her parents and her brother each owned houses in the same neighborhood in Fort Myers, near the Causeway. lan destroyed all three.

While sorting out the next steps for herself and her family, *Patty had* to move six times over the next 14 months. At one point, she lived in a camper where her home once stood.

Two things kept Patty going: her job as a Police Aide with the City of Sanibel, and the chance to find affordable housing through Community Housing & Resources. "When the opportunity came up for housing through CHR, I got really excited," said Patty. "CHR and my work - saved me from the depression people ao through after a disaster like that. I can't praise the program enough."

While Patty and her family continue to move forward, she looks back with gratitude.

CHR RESIDENT INSPIRES GIFT

Sonny Kovanes knew just what to do after CHR helped him find safe, affordable housing after Hurricane lan: he told his boss. Kovanes' story and passion for Sanibel-Captiva prompted his employer, e-commerce giant Amazon.com Inc., to make a \$25,000 gift to CHR to help with ongoing recovery efforts.

"We were so pleased CHR helped Sonny so quickly after the hurricane," said Greg Rios, regional public relations specialist for Amazon. "When we heard his story and were aware of the destruction, we knew we had to get involved."

Kovanes, Rios and other Amazon representatives met with CHR staff and residents at CHR's Woodhaven property to deliver the check. CHR Executive Director Nicole McHale thanked the Amazon team and briefed them on the recovery work. "It's so exciting for Amazon to make this gift at a time when we least expect it but need it most!"
