## SUPPLEMENTAL AND ALTERNATIVE METHOD OF MAKING LOCAL MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS

# 170.01 Authority for providing improvements and levying and collecting special assessments against property benefited.—

(1) Any municipality of this state may, by its governing authority:

(a) Provide for the construction, reconstruction, repair, paving, repaving, hard surfacing, rehard surfacing, widening, guttering, and draining of streets, boulevards, and alleys; for grading, regrading, leveling, laying, relaying, paving, repaving, hard surfacing, and rehard surfacing of sidewalks; for constructing or reconstructing

permanent pedestrian canopies over public sidewalks; and in connection with any of the foregoing, provide related lighting, landscaping, street furniture, signage, and other amenities as determined by the governing authority of the municipality;

(b) Order the construction, reconstruction, repair, renovation, excavation, grading, stabilization, and upgrading of greenbelts, swales, culverts, sanitary sewers, storm sewers, outfalls, canals, primary, secondary, and tertiary drains, water bodies, marshlands, and natural areas, all or part of a comprehensive stormwater management system, including the necessary appurtenances and structures thereto and including, but not limited to, dams, weirs, and pumps;

(c) Order the construction or reconstruction of water mains, water laterals, alternative water supply systems, including, but not limited to, reclaimed water, aquifer storage and recovery, and desalination systems, and other water distribution facilities, including the necessary appurtenances thereto;

(d) Pay for the relocation of utilities, including the placement underground of electrical, telephone, and cable television services, pursuant to voluntary agreement with the utility, but nothing contained in this paragraph shall affect a utility's right to locate or relocate its facilities on its own initiative at its own expense;

(e) Provide for the construction or reconstruction of parks and other public recreational facilities and improvements, including appurtenances thereto;

- (f) Provide for the construction or reconstruction of seawalls;
- (g) Provide for the drainage and reclamation of wet, low, or overflowed lands;
- (h) Provide for offstreet parking facilities, parking garages, or similar facilities;
- (i) Provide for mass transportation systems;
- (j) Provide for improvements to permit the passage and navigation of watercraft; and

(k) Provide for the payment of all or any part of the costs of any such improvements by levying and collecting special assessments on the abutting, adjoining, contiguous, or other specially benefited property.

However, offstreet parking facilities, parking garages, or other similar facilities and mass transportation systems must be approved by vote of a majority of the affected property owners. Any municipality which is legally obligated for providing capital improvements for water, alternative water supplies, including, but not limited to, reclaimed water, water from aquifer storage and recovery, and desalination systems, or sewer facilities within an unincorporated area of the county may recover the costs of the capital improvements by levying and collecting special assessments for the purposes authorized in this section on the specially benefited property; however, collections of the special assessment shall not take place until the specially benefited property connects to the capital improvement.

(2) Special assessments may be levied only for the purposes enumerated in this section and shall be levied only on benefited real property at a rate of assessment based on the special benefit accruing to such property from such improvements when the improvements funded by the special assessment provide a benefit which is different in type or degree from benefits provided to the community as a whole.

(3) Any municipality, subject to the approval of a majority of the affected property owners, may levy and collect special assessments against property benefited for the purpose of stabilizing and improving:

- (a) Retail business districts,
- (b) Wholesale business districts, or
- (c) Nationally recognized historic districts,

or any combination of such districts, through promotion, management, marketing, and other similar services in such districts of the municipality. This subsection does not authorize a municipality to use bond proceeds to fund ongoing operations of these districts.

(4) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a municipality may not levy special assessments for the provision of fire protection services on lands classified as agricultural lands under s. 193.461 unless the land contains a residential dwelling or nonresidential farm building, with the exception of an agricultural pole barn, provided the nonresidential farm building exceeds a just value of \$10,000. Such special assessments must be based

solely on the special benefit accruing to that portion of the land consisting of the residential dwelling and curtilage, and qualifying nonresidential farm buildings. As used in this subsection, the term "agricultural pole barn" means a nonresidential farm building in which 70 percent or more of the perimeter walls are permanently open and allow free ingress and egress.

Method of prorating special assessments.—Special assessments against property deemed to be 170.02 benefited by local improvements, as provided for in s. 170.01, shall be assessed upon the property specially benefited by the improvement in proportion to the benefits to be derived therefrom, said special benefits to be determined and prorated according to the foot frontage of the respective properties specially benefited by said improvement, or by such other method as the governing body of the municipality may prescribe.

170.03 **Resolution required to declare special assessments.**—When the governing authority of any municipality may determine to make any public improvement authorized by s. 170.01 and defray the whole or any part of the expense thereof by special assessments, said governing authority shall so declare by resolution stating the nature of the proposed improvement, designating the street or streets or sidewalks to be so improved, the location of said sanitary sewers, storm sewers, and drains, the location of said water mains, water laterals, and other water distribution facilities, the location of the utilities, the location of the recreational facilities, the location of the seawalls, the location of the drainage project, or the location of the retail or wholesale business districts or nationally recognized historic districts to be improved, and the part or portion of the expense thereof to be paid by special assessments, the manner in which said assessments shall be made, when said assessments are to be paid, what part, if any, shall be apportioned to be paid from the general improvement fund of the municipality; and said resolution shall also designate the lands upon which the special assessments shall be levied, and in describing said lands it shall be sufficient to describe them as "all lots and lands adjoining and contiguous or bounding and abutting upon such improvements or specially benefited thereby and further designated by the assessment plat hereinafter provided for." Such resolution shall also state the total estimated cost of the improvement. Such estimated cost may include the cost of construction or reconstruction, the cost of all labor and materials, the cost of all lands, property, rights, easements, and franchises acquired, financing charges, interest prior to and during construction and for 1 year after completion of construction, discount on the sale of special assessment bonds, cost of plans and specifications, surveys of estimates of costs and of revenues, cost of engineering and legal services, and all other expenses necessary or incident to determining the feasibility or practicability of such construction or reconstruction, administrative expense, and such other expense as may be necessary or incident to the financing herein authorized.

170.04 Plans and specifications, with estimated cost of proposed improvement required before adoption of resolution.—At the time of the adoption of the resolution provided for in s. 170.03, there shall be on file with the town or city clerk, or like officer, of the municipality adopting said resolution, an assessment plat showing the area to be assessed, with plans and specifications, and an estimate of the cost of the proposed improvement, which assessment plat, plans and specifications and estimate shall be open to the inspection of the public.

170.05 **Publication of resolution.**—Upon the adoption of the resolution provided for in s. 170.03, the municipality shall cause said resolution to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation published in said municipality, and if there be no newspaper published in said municipality, the governing authority of said municipality shall cause said resolution to be published once a week for a period of 2 weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county in which said municipality is located.

**170.06 Preliminary assessment roll.**—Upon the adoption of the resolution aforesaid, the governing authority of the municipality shall cause to be made a preliminary assessment roll in accordance with the method of assessment provided for in said resolution, which assessment roll shall be completed as promptly as possible; said assessment roll shall show the lots and lands assessed and the amount of the benefit to and the assessment against each lot or parcel of land, and, if said assessment is to be paid in installments, the number of annual installments in which the assessment is divided shall also be entered and shown upon said assessment roll.

170.07 Publication of preliminary assessment roll.-Upon the completion of said preliminary assessment roll, the governing authority of the municipality shall by resolution fix a time and place at which the owners of the property to be assessed or any other persons interested therein may appear before said governing authority and be heard as to the propriety and advisability of making such improvements, as to the cost thereof, as to the manner of payment therefor, and as to the amount thereof to be assessed against each property so improved. Thirty days' notice in writing of such time and place shall be given to such property owners. The notice shall include the amount of the assessment and shall be served by mailing a copy to each of such property owners at his or her last known address, the names and addresses of such property owners to be obtained from the records of the property appraiser or from such other sources as the city or town clerk or engineer deems reliable, proof of such mailing to be made by the affidavit of the clerk or deputy clerk of said municipality, or by the engineer, said proof to be filed with the clerk, provided, that failure to mail said notice or notices shall not invalidate any of the proceedings hereunder. Notice of the time and place of such hearing shall also be given by two publications a week apart in a newspaper of general circulation in said municipality, and if there be no newspaper published in said municipality the governing authority of said municipality shall cause said notice to be published in like manner in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county in which said municipality is located; provided that the last publication shall be at least 1 week prior to the date of the hearing. Said notice shall describe the streets or other areas to be improved and advise all persons interested that the description of each property to be assessed and the amount to be assessed to each piece or parcel of property may be ascertained at the office of the clerk of the municipality. Such service by publication shall be verified by the affidavit of the publisher and filed with the clerk of said municipality.

170.08 Final consideration of special assessments; equalizing board to hear complaints and adjust assessments; rebate of difference in cost and assessment.—At the time and place named in the notice provided for in s. 170.07, the governing authority of the municipality shall meet and hear testimony from affected property owners as to the propriety and advisability of making the improvements and funding them with special assessments on property. Following the testimony, the governing authority of the municipality shall make a final decision on whether to levy the special assessments. Thereafter, the governing authority shall meet as an equalizing board to hear and consider any and all complaints as to the special assessments and shall adjust and equalize the assessments on a basis of justice and right. When so equalized and approved by resolution or ordinance of the governing authority, a final assessment roll shall be filed with the governing authority of the municipality, and such assessments shall stand confirmed and remain legal, valid, and binding first liens upon the property against which such assessments are made until paid; however, upon completion of the improvement, the municipality shall credit to each of the assessments the difference in the assessment as originally made, approved, and confirmed and the proportionate part of the actual cost of the improvement to be paid by special assessments as finally determined upon the completion of the improvement, but in no event shall the final assessments exceed the amount of benefits originally assessed. Promptly after such confirmation, the assessments shall be recorded by the city clerk in a special book, to be known as the "Improvement Lien Book," and the record of the lien in this book shall constitute prima facie evidence of its validity. The governing authority of the municipality may by resolution grant a discount equal to all or a part of the payee's proportionate share of the cost of the project consisting of bond financing costs, such as capitalized interest, funded reserves, and bond discount included in the estimated cost of

the project, upon payment in full of any assessment during such period prior to the time such financing costs are incurred as may be specified by the governing authority.

**170.09 Priority of lien; interest; and method of payment.**—The special assessments shall be payable at the time and in the manner stipulated in the resolution providing for the improvement; shall remain liens, coequal with the lien of all state, county, district, and municipal taxes, superior in dignity to all other liens, titles, and claims, until paid; shall bear interest, at a rate not to exceed 8 percent per year, or, if bonds are issued pursuant to this chapter, at a rate not to exceed 1 percent above the rate of interest at which the improvement bonds authorized pursuant to this chapter and used for the improvement are sold, from the date of the acceptance of the improvement; and may, by the resolution aforesaid and only for capital outlay projects, be made payable in equal installments over a period not to exceed 30 years notwithstanding any special act to the contrary, to which, if not paid when due, there shall be added a penalty at the rate of 1 percent per month, until paid. However, the assessments may be paid without interest at any time within 30 days after the improvement is completed and a resolution accepting the same has been adopted by the governing authority.

170.10 Legal proceedings instituted upon failure of property owner to pay special assessment or interest when due; foreclosure; service of process.—Each annual installment provided for in s. 170.09 shall be paid upon the dates specified in said resolution, with interest upon all deferred payments, until the entire amount of said assessment has been paid, and upon the failure of any property owner to pay any annual installment due, or any part thereof, or any annual interest upon deferred payments, the governing authority of the municipality shall cause to be brought the necessary legal proceedings by a bill in chancery to enforce payment thereof with all accrued interest and penalties, together with all legal costs incurred, including a reasonable solicitor's fee, to be assessed as part of the costs and in the event of default in the payment of any installment of an assessment, or any accrued interest on said assessment, the whole assessment, with the interest and penalties thereon, shall immediately become due and payable and subject to foreclosure. In the foreclosure of any special assessment service of process against unknown or nonresident defendants may be had by publication, as now provided by law in other chancery suits. The foreclosure proceedings shall be prosecuted to a sale and conveyance of the property involved in said proceedings as now provided by law in suits to foreclose mortgages; or, in the alternative, said proceeding may be instituted and prosecuted under chapter 173.

Bonds may be issued to an amount not exceeding the amount of liens assessed for the cost of 170.11 **improvements to be paid by special assessment.**—After the equalization, approval and confirmation of the levying of the special assessments for improvements as provided by s. 170.08 and as soon as a contract for said improvement has been finally let, the governing authority of the municipality may by resolution or ordinance authorize the issuance of bonds, to be designated "Improvement bonds, series No.," in an amount not in excess of the aggregate amount of said liens levied for such improvements. Said bonds shall be payable from a special and separate fund, to be known as the "Improvement fund, series No.," which shall be used solely for the payment of the principal and interest of said "Improvement bonds, series No." and for no other purpose. Said fund shall be deposited in a separate bank account; and all the proceeds collected by the city from the principal, interest, and penalties of said liens shall be deposited and held in said fund. Said bonds so issued shall never exceed the amount of liens assessed, and said bonds shall mature not later than 2 years after the maturity of the last installment of said liens. Said bonds shall bear certificates signed by the clerk of the municipality certifying that the amount of liens levied, the proceeds of which are pledged to the payment of said bonds, are equal to the amount of the bonds issued. The bonds may be delivered to the contractor in payment for his or her work or may be sold at public or private sale for not less than 95 percent of par and accrued interest, the proceeds to be used in paying for the cost of the work. Said bonds shall not be a general obligation of the city, but shall be payable solely out of said

assessments, installments, interest, penalties, provided that said bonds may be secured by any other revenues that may be legally available for such purpose. Any surplus remaining after payment of all bonds and interest thereon shall revert to the city and be used for any municipal purpose. Bonds issued under this section may be refunded from time to time as provided in this section.

170.14 Governing authority of municipality required to make new assessments until valid assessment is made if special assessment is omitted or held invalid.—If any special assessment made under the provisions of this chapter to defray the whole or any part of the expense of any said improvement shall be either in whole or in part annulled, vacated or set aside by the judgment of any court, or if the governing authority of any municipality shall be satisfied that any such assessment is so irregular or defective that the same cannot be enforced or collected, or if the governing authority of a municipality shall have omitted to make such assessment when it might have done so, the governing authority of the municipality shall take all necessary steps to cause a new assessment to be made for the whole or any part of any improvement or against any property benefited by any improvement, following as nearly as may be the provisions of this chapter and in case such second assessment shall be annulled, said governing authority of any municipality may obtain and make other assessments until a valid assessment shall be made.

**170.15 Expenditures for improvements.**—The governing authority of any municipality may pay out of its general funds or out of any special fund that may be provided for that purpose such portion of the cost of any improvement as it may deem proper.

170.16 Assessment roll sufficient evidence of assessment and other proceedings of this chapter; variance not material unless party objecting materially injured thereby.—Any informality or irregularity in the proceedings in connection with the levy of any special assessment under the provisions of this chapter shall not affect the validity of the special assessment where the assessment roll has been confirmed by the governing authority. The assessment roll as finally approved and confirmed shall be competent and sufficient evidence that the assessment was duly levied, that the assessment was duly made and adopted, and that all other proceedings adequate to the adoption of the assessment roll were duly had, taken, and performed as required by this chapter, and no variance from the directions hereunder shall be held material unless it be clearly shown that the party objecting was materially injured thereby. However, nothing in this section shall relieve the governing authority from notifying the affected property owners of the special assessments as required by this chapter.

**170.17 Denomination of bonds; interest; place of payment; form; signatures; coupons; and delivery.**—All bonds issued under this chapter shall be the denomination of \$500, or some multiple thereof, and shall bear interest as provided in s. 215.84 until paid in full, payable annually or semiannually, and both principal and interest shall be payable at such place or places as the governing authority may determine. The form of such bonds shall be fixed by resolution of the governing authority of the municipality, and said bonds shall be signed by the mayor or chief executive officer of the municipality and the clerk or other like officers thereof, under the seal of the municipality; the coupons, if any, shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officers. The delivery of any bond and coupon so executed at any time thereafter shall be valid although before the date of delivery the person signing such bond or coupons shall cease to hold office.

**170.18** Notice required where no newspaper is published in county in which municipality is situated.— Where, by any of the provisions of this chapter, any notice is required to be given by publication in a newspaper, if there be no newspaper published in the county in which the municipality is situated, then such notice shall be posted for the prescribed period of time in at least five public places in the municipality, one of which shall be the city or town hall, or the place of meeting of the governing authority, if there be no city or town hall. **170.19 Construction and authority of chapter.**—This chapter shall, without reference to any other law of Florida, be full authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds by this chapter authorized, and shall be construed as an additional and alternative method for the financing of the improvements referred to herein. No ordinance, resolution, election or proceeding in respect of the issuance of any bonds hereunder shall be necessary, except such as is required by this chapter, and no publication of any resolution, ordinance, election, notice or proceeding relating to the issuance of the bonds provided for by this chapter shall be required, except such as required by this chapter.

**170.20 Bonds negotiable.**—Bonds issued under s. 170.11 shall have all the qualities of negotiable paper under the law merchant, and shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the proceedings for the issue and sale thereof, and shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or holders thereof for value. #### 170.201 Special assessments.—

(1) In addition to other lawful authority to levy and collect special assessments, the governing body of a municipality may levy and collect special assessments to fund capital improvements and municipal services, including, but not limited to, fire protection, emergency medical services, garbage disposal, sewer improvement, street improvement, and parking facilities. Without limiting the foregoing, a municipality that has a population of fewer than 100 persons for the previous year's taxing year may also levy and collect special assessments to fund special security and crime prevention services and facilities, including guard and gatehouse facilities for the current taxing year. However, if prior to the levy of the assessment, the cost of the services and facilities are funded by ad valorem taxes, the taxes shall be abated annually thereafter, in an amount equal to the full amount of the special assessment. The governing body of a municipality may apportion costs of such special assessments based on:

(a) The front or square footage of each parcel of land; or

(b) An alternative methodology, so long as the amount of the assessment for each parcel of land is not in excess of the proportional benefits as compared to other assessments on other parcels of land.

(2) Property owned or occupied by a religious institution and used as a place of worship or education; by a public or private elementary, middle, or high school; or by a governmentally financed, insured, or subsidized housing facility that is used primarily for persons who are elderly or disabled shall be exempt from any special assessment levied by a municipality to fund any service if the municipality so desires. As used in this subsection, the term "religious institution" means any church, synagogue, or other established physical place for worship at which nonprofit religious services and activities are regularly conducted and carried on and the term "governmentally financed, insured, or subsidized housing facility" means a facility that is financed by a mortgage loan made or insured by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development under s. 8, s. 202, s. 221(d)(3) or (4), s. 232, or s. 236 of the National Housing Act and is owned or operated by an entity that qualifies as an exempt charitable organization under s. 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Dear Chris,

We are writing you to let you know how damage from Hurricane Milton severely impacted the depth of the bay water in back our home. The mere fact that our property is across the street from the Gulf of Mexico is proof enough as to why the bay quickly filled with sand from the storm surge. The day after Milton we had to wait to return to our home as Sanibel Captiva Road was covered with sand that had been washed from the beach, across San Cap Road, across our property into the Bay. Once San Cap Road was accessible (from a large amount of work by the city of Sanibel) we were unable to access our home by car as our driveway, composed of pit shell and crushed shells, had been washed out into the bay leaving a hole approximately 6 feet deep and enough erosion to require about 60 tons of pit shell to replace it. Our pool was full of sand necessitating a complete professional pump out. Our garage and lower level of our house was filled with silt, our dock on the water was covered with silt from the sand and vegetation from our yard. Other debris such as mailboxes, boards, plastic, etc. were washed towards the bay and had to be cleaned from the mangroves and the water. Large heavy rocks and patio stones were also washed away from the power of the surge water. Based on the information provided, we strongly feel that our home, and the homes next to ours should be included in the dredging project to offset the damage caused by Hurricane Milton to our water access and quality. Please let us know if we can provide photos or other information to support justification for dredging behind our homes. Thanks for all your help

It is absolutely critical that anybody involved with the proposed dredging project for Sunset Bay understand how devastating the impacts from Hurricane Milton were to my property, as well as the neighbors to the north and south of me on Sanibel Captiva Road.

The amount of sand that washed through my property from the Gulf and into Sunset Bay caused significant negative and irreversible consequences for the future use of my site. As City records will indicate, I had been in the process of planning a very elaborate pool installation for the front (Gulf side) of my home and had spent months of time and tens of thousands of dollars on surveys, engineering and other related expenses in order to get this done. Fortunately, this project was not started or completed before Milton ransacked my lot. Once I saw the utter devastation caused by Milton and realized that my dream pool would have been absolutely destroyed by Milton, I promptly withdrew my permit applications.

The sand that accumulated in my yard destroyed the landscape I had started replacing after Ian, forced me to bring in 65 tons of shell to replace my driveway and killed several mature trees that subsequently required removal. The entire underside of my house was filled with sand, which destroyed everything that was being stored in that space.

As far as my frontage on Sunset Bay is concerned, it has been rendered virtually useless, as a result of the sand that poured into the bay from Hurricane Milton. My view is now predominantly bottomlands more often than not. I have to juggle the tides just to use my kayak, otherwise I cannot return to my home and have personally helped push out several boaters who were unfamiliar with the water situation and became stuck in front of my house. And, to compound this matter, I pay waterfront taxes, but cannot use my waterfront!! What could be more frustrating or self-defeating than this simple fact?

I have been informed that the dredging project on Sunset Bay will stop at the site of the former Castaways Marina. It is wildly absurd that our residences on Sanibel Captiva Road

(6494, 6496 and 6498) ARE NOT included in the proposed dredging project. We were substantially harmed by the impacts of Milton, experienced a reduction in property value from the impacts of Milton and had our riparian rights severely restricted because of Milton. Further, if our sites are not dredged, the sand that is left under our docks and in front of our homes will clearly migrate back into the dredged area, rendering the investment made in our area a complete waste of funds.

We want to be included in the dredging project. We deserve to be included in the dredging project. We need to be included in the dredging project. Frankly, excluding us is a blatant disservice to the aforementioned households.

We urge the reconsideration of the position that excludes us and sincerely appreciate any and all efforts to support our cause. We LOVE SANIBEL and want to enjoy all that it has to offer.

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## 1)

While we learned a great deal, one issue stands out as the single thing that no one mentioned. There seems to be great interest in awarding the dredging contract by Sept 1. However, it appears that awarding that contract automatically triggers the creation of the SAD, unless we are mistaken.

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Please take this into consideration.

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It is very apparent that solving the Wulfert issue is quite straightforward and would solve access issues for many of the boaters the area, with perhaps the exception of Sunset Bay.

You heard from a neighbor, Nicolas Weyers, that he is prepared to do that dredging immediately. The City would definitely be remiss if it did not immediately investigate this opportunity.

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There was much discussion about this project being about navigational safety. But unless I am mistaken, that is not the responsibility of the City. Wulfert Channel and Dinkins Bayou are not man-made canals; they are Navigable Waters within the meaning of the act, and as such are the responsibility of the USACE (US Army Corps of Engineers), (please see sections of the US CFR attached) thus subject to USACE oversight.

Navigation safety on the waters of the US is almost certainly the responsibility of the Coast Guard, not the City. I doubt that using it as a justification for the project is a defensible position.

## 5)

Having spent many years navigating Dinkins Bayou, including the Pine Tree canal and beyond, we can say clearly that the dredging issues in the upper reaches of the Bayou are exaggerated. There are indeed shoal spots, which can be avoided with skill and attention.

Again, this is a place where Mr Weyers could likely solve any issues quickly and inexpensively, and more importantly without the necessity for an SAD.

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## 6)

This project is overkill. The affected dredging areas are small (with the exception of Sunset Bay) and easily, quickly and most importantly, inexpensively solved without burdening abutters with unnecessary tax burdens.

We remain totally opposed to this project both in its scope as currently defined, and especially in the financing approach being considered.

Navigable waters of the United States are those waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible for use to transport interstate or foreign commerce. A determination of navigability, once made, applies laterally over the entire surface of the waterbody, and is not extinguished by later actions or events which impede or destroy navigable capacity.

## § 329.7 Intrastate or interstate nature of waterway.

A waterbody may be entirely within a state, yet still be capable of carrying interstate commerce. This is especially clear when it physically connects with a generally acknowledged avenue of interstate commerce, such as the ocean or one of the Great Lakes, and is yet wholly within one state. Nor is it necessary that there be a physically navigable connection across a state boundary. Where a waterbody extends through one or more states, but substantial portions, which are capable of bearing interstate commerce, are located in only one of the states, the entirety of the waterway up to the head (upper limit) of navigation is subject to Federal jurisdiction.

#### 329.12 Geographic and jurisdictional limits of oceanic and tidal waters.

(a) **Ocean and coastal waters.** The navigable waters of the United States over which Corps of Engineers regulatory jurisdiction extends include all ocean and coastal waters within a zone three geographic (nautical) miles seaward from the baseline (The Territorial Seas). Wider zones are recognized for special regulatory powers exercised over the outer continental shelf. (See <u>33 CFR 322.3(b)</u>).

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Navigable waters of the United States are those waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible for use to transport interstate or foreign commerce. A determination of navigability, once made, applies laterally over the entire surface of the waterbody, and is not extinguished by later actions or events which impede or destroy navigable capacity. **§ 329.7 Intrastate or interstate nature of waterway.** 

#### **8 329.7 Intrastate or interstate nature of waterway.** A waterbody may be entirely within a state, yet still be capable.

A waterbody may be entirely within a state, yet still be capable of carrying interstate commerce. This is especially clear when it physically connects with a generally acknowledged avenue of interstate commerce, such as the ocean or one of the Great Lakes, and is yet wholly within one state. Nor is it necessary that there be a physically navigable connection across a state boundary. Where a waterbody extends through one or more states, but substantial portions, which are capable of bearing interstate commerce, are located in only one of the states, the entirety of the waterway up to the head (upper limit) of navigation is subject to Federal jurisdiction.

#### 329.12 Geographic and jurisdictional limits of oceanic and tidal waters.

(a) **Ocean and coastal waters.** The navigable waters of the United States over which Corps of Engineers regulatory jurisdiction extends include all ocean and coastal waters within a zone three geographic (nautical) miles seaward from the baseline (The Territorial Seas). Thus creating additional expense. I believe the existing canal, pathway is grandfathered in their current locations. Should it need to do some silt removal this will be far less disruptive of the environment as well as considerably less expensive. As a result of relying on inaccurate information from the private engineering firm that recommended a culvert between clam bayou and Dinkins bayou which resulted in not only significant silting by opening clam bayou into Dinkins Bayou but profound erosion of private property due to increased currents and flooding over the banks of the canal in storms. This is a massive project with environmental and economic impact on all of us, not just those who live on the waterway. The damage done by this ill informed decision has had permanent consequences including flooding across Pine Tree Dr from surges through the culvert into the canal.

We want Dana Souza and the engineers to know our property at 6498 Sanibel Captiva Road was severely impacted by hurricane Milton. Once again the waters from the gulf washed over our property surrounding our home and dumping sand and silt into the waterway along our property and surrounding area. There were mounds of sand left behind everywhere. The gulf waters also breeched the mangroves along Blind Pass and pushed in large amounts of sand and silt. The build up of sand in the area has severely impacted our water route from our dock in both direction; toward Blind Pass and back through Sunset Bay to Dinkins Bayou. The route we need to navigate is significantly narrowed and shallower. The tide needs to be even higher for us to get out and back. This is all due to sand and silt buildup limiting access from our dock.

The mounds of sand left behind in Blind Pass and Turner Beach parking lot, in the point under and surrounding the bridge only supports the amount of sand that was pushed into Sunset Bay. Also, the Captive side of the blind pass bridge got washed out into the bay side. It's a travesty if the 4 homes on Sunset Bay closest to the gulf where much of the sand from Milton was dumped are not included in this dredging plan. It makes no sense to have the dredging equipment there and not include us.

Thank you for your response. Apologies for my delay in reply.


I don't think the project should be delayed. However, I do believe we should have further discussions in parallel regarding the properties on the Captiva side of Blind Pass and Roosevelt Channel with the City of Captiva to include them in the tax district. They will 100% benefit from this effort and should be included.

And while some people living on Dinkins may be voicing concern because they are "not boaters", from my perspective they are voicing concern because they don't want to pay for it. They own waterfront property and I'm sure they want to protect the value of their asset, however they simply don't want to be burdened by the expense in doing so. I appreciate they don't want to pay for it (and neither do I in a perfect world), however the fact that they own property on the water I believe obligates them to be included.

That said, I think we also need to acknowledge this is not simply a "boating issue". This is also a significant environmental issue. The silt buildup will also dramatically impact wildlife and other shoreline areas, just as it has in Clam Bayou over the years. And as I have heard from other neighbors, the same issue was also part of the historical rationale to open up Clam Bayou under San Cap Rd because the lack of waterflow in Clam Bayou was impacting wildlife and killing mangroves in multiple areas along that shoreline -- and losing those mangroves would also create major erosion issues for the island going forward.

If this issue is not addressed and maintained going forward, the same issues could also happen in other areas of the "Wulfert Channel system". As you can also see from the attached image taken in the mid-90s and again today from Google Earth, these waterways have dramatically changed over the years due to silt and sand redistribution -- including a former channel from Blind Pass into Sunset Bay, which is now gone. Failure to maintain these areas will also impact other areas of the Wulfert Channel system in the future, including Ding Darling which is a significant part of this ecosystem. Given this, have we also engaged Ding Darling to see how they want to be included and participate in this remediation and effort going forward?

I agree with you that it would be more fair for the homes on Roosevelt Channel to share in the costs.

We have also heard from residents who live around Dinkins Bayou who are not boaters and who do not support the creation of a new Assessment District.

I would be curious to know if most of the Sanibel residents who are negatively impacted by the sediment in the water would prefer that the assessment be delayed while we seek out further discussion with Captiva residents.

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I am writing to express my confusion over the planned Special Assessment. There are a number of areas which I feel require clarification.

1. Why are the households within Dinkins Bayou being required to subsidise the dredging of Wilfred Channel in Blind Pass? This benefits both Sanibel and Captiva in general. I understand dredging the Dinkins Bayou area is of direct benefit to residents, but the channel is used by almost all boaters in the area. Therefore the Special Assessment should only cover the Dinkin Bayou proposal.

2. Why is it only residences with boat access that are required to contribute? There are public boat accesses in the area. Therefore all residents in the area will benefit from the dredging. In which case the Special Assessment should encompass these houses which will also benefit. Unless the Council is proposing to close all these accesses, the proposed Special Assessment houses do not have exclusive access and benefit of these areas, and should not have therefore have the exclusive burden of the costs.

1. The first that we were aware of the proposal for the dredging and special assessment district was May 29th when we received the letter from the town dated May 21st. We only became aware of prior discussions at the town council after reading the minutes of the May council meeting after receiving the letter dated the 21st. Prior to that time no one had contacted us about our opinions on the need to dredge or on the appropriateness of a special assessment district.

2. In the letter dated on the 21st it stated that the reason for the dredging was for the safety of boating due to hurricane impacts. RE: The Wulfert and Dinkins Bayou Dredging Project and Special Assessment District

Dear Council Members,

While the navigation issue may be real, we do not feel this SAD is the appropriate solution.

### We are writing to oppose the Special Assessment District as currently proposed.

- The notice period for this meeting agenda on June 3<sup>rd</sup> was way too short. Many affected residents did not receive this notice in time to prepare to comment in an informed or timely manner.
- If you make an approximate count of the affected abuttors (i.e., those with boats large enough to encounter problems navigating the Dinkins Bayou entrance or Wulfert Channel) we feel that it will be a small percentage of the affected abuttors. Suppose it might be 40 users, then another 160 abuttors are being asked to pay to solve this issue. We have personally navigated all the canals off Dinkins Bayou often, and while we have never counted the number of large draft boats, it is not enormous.
- One resident abutting Dinkins Bayou asserts that he has had no issues using a 28 ft. Dauntless in the waters.
- We have not received a copy of the legal reasoning whereby Sanibel decides that this is its problem.
- Wulfert Channel and Dinkins Bayou are Navigable Waters within the meaning of the act, and as such are the reponsibility of the USACE (US Army Corps of Engineers); please see sections of the US CFR attached.
- Abuttors are being asked/told to pay for work which will not benefit most of them; however, this dredging project will benefit many non-Sanibel residents, who will not be required to pay for any of ths work. This project is at a minimum one which should be funded by Lee County and the State, not by local residents of Sanibel.
- Mention is made of protecting property values of abuttors. Is protection of property value actually one of the responsibilities of the City of Sanibel?
- If a future claim is made by a boater alleging that the dredging is improperly done, will abuttors in the SAD be liable?
- Sanibel has experienced three hurricanes in three years. The waters of the Carribean and the Gulf of Mexico are warming so fast that hurricanes now develop independently in those seas, without having begun off the west coast of Africa. Two of those storms (Ian and Milton) had enormous effects on the profiles of the Wulfert and Dinkins Bayou channels. The proposed 10 year planning horizon is meaningless when we contemplate

that more such hurricanes are highly likely to occur within that horizon. What happens then? Will dredging be done sooner than 2035? Who will then pay for it?

- The last dredge of Blind Pass and part of the Wulfert Channel was in 2017. Following that there was a comprehensive, and very public, process to review the dredging template for future work. Those of us who participated provided input to the planning firm about the historic pattern of flows through Sunset Bay. When the firm ran their model with that modification, they found that adding to the dredging template to include Sunset Bay would significantly improve flows through Blind Pass.
- For those interested in the dredging history of Blind Pass, please visit this page.
- The last dredging was done for environmental reasons, not to improve navigation.
- The 2019 management plan in which many of us participated, is reported <u>here</u>. If you scroll down to page 10 of that report, you will see the final preferred option, Figure 5.
   That option would resolve whatever issues boaters may feel they now face.
- The current proposed dredging and funding is a short-sighted effort, with no apparent responses planned in the event of a re-occurrence in a period less than the 10 year planning horizon. Meanwhile, abuttors are expected to pay an annual tax which will not suffice to respond to re-occurring storm changes. When this navigation problem happens again in 5 years, will the SAD feel obliged, or be allowed to make additional assessments?

We urge the Council to at a minimum table this project until answers to these points are more carefully researched. Fundamentally, this dredging should not be undertaken by the City of Sanibel when it so clearly benefits many users from many other communities, and so few of the abuttors.

If the Council decides to proceed with this effort, then at a very bare minmum the affected abuttors should have the opportunity to vote on this proposal; to do otherwise amounts to taxation without representation.

# § 329.4 General definition.

Navigable waters of the United States are those waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible for use to transport interstate or foreign commerce. A determination of navigability, once made, applies laterally over the entire surface of the waterbody, and is not extinguished by later actions or events which impede or destroy navigable capacity.

### § 329.7 Intrastate or interstate nature of waterway.

A waterbody may be entirely within a state, yet still be capable of carrying interstate commerce. This is especially clear when it physically connects with a generally acknowledged avenue of interstate commerce, such as the ocean or one of the Great Lakes, and is yet wholly within one state. Nor is it necessary that there be a physically navigable connection across a state boundary. Where a waterbody extends through one or more states, but substantial portions, which are capable of bearing interstate commerce, are located in only one of the states, the entirety of the waterway up to the head (upper limit) of navigation is subject to Federal jurisdiction.

# 329.12 Geographic and jurisdictional limits of oceanic and tidal waters.

(a) **Ocean and coastal waters.** The navigable waters of the United States over which Corps of Engineers regulatory jurisdiction extends include all ocean and coastal waters within a zone three geographic (nautical) miles seaward from the baseline (The Territorial Seas). Wider zones are recognized for special regulatory powers exercised over the outer continental shelf. (See <u>33 CFR 322.3(b)</u>).

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Dear Sanibel City Council Members,

I am writing to express my strong opposition to the proposed dredging assessment that would require 202 property owners to pay over \$10,600, with an additional \$1,200 annually starting in 2026. This proposal places a disproportionate financial burden on a small number of residents for the maintenance of public waterways-resources that benefit and are accessed by the wider community, not just those being asked to fund them. These are not private canals tucked away for exclusive neighborhood use. Wulfert Channel, Sunset Bay, and Dinkins Bayou are **publicly navigable waters**, often traversed by people from all over the island and beyond. On any given day, we see charter boats, kayakers, and recreational boaters using these channels, many of whom have no ties to the properties now being asked to carry the cost of dredging and long-term maintenance. We received our letter from the City by regular mail on May 28th, providing less than a week's notice before the scheduled June 3rd meeting. Several of our neighbors—who are also included in the proposed assessment district—still have **not received any** notification. This inconsistent communication, combined with the compressed timeline, undermines the ability of residents to fairly review and respond to the proposal. If these waterways are indeed public—as their daily use clearly reflects—then their care and upkeep should be treated as a public responsibility, funded through appropriate city, county, or even state mechanisms. Targeting a narrow group of property owners to subsidize the upkeep of a community-wide resource is inequitable and, frankly, shortsighted.

We are all invested in preserving Sanibel's natural beauty, environmental health, and access to its cherished waterways. But that preservation must come

through **collaborative, fair, and transparent processes**, not by quietly shifting the financial responsibility onto a select few.

I urge you to halt this proposal as currently structured and take time to reconsider how our public resources are funded—ensuring equity, transparency, and proper notice for all island residents.

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Good morning. Brief status update on our interactions with the City regarding the need for dredging Wulfert Channel. On Saturday I showed newly appointed councilwoman Laura DeBruce Dinkins Bayou, Sunset Bay and Wulfert Channel, focusing on the major problem in Wulfert. Being a boater herself she understood the treacherous situation. I think it's fair to say she was somewhat surprised by the number of households and boats that need to utilize that stretch of water to get to the bay and the Gulf. She has asked for information about the number of boats that are on Dinkins, Sunset Bay, and all of the canals. I write in support of the dredging of Wulfert Channel and Dinkins Bayou.

The cause for the Bayou shoaling was the City's decision to connect Dinkins and Clam Bayous via a culvert under San Cap Road. The consequences have been disastrous for the residents and for the environment.

Before the culvert was installed the waterway and shoreline were stable. Afterwards, and continuing each day, the dramatic increase in current has torn out over a mile of shoreline mangroves, taken private property away with unchecked erosion and created the large sandbar deposits that now clog Dinkins Bayou. Those man-made sandbars are our former property. If a private property owner had made these Corps of Engineers type changes to the Sanibel environment, the City would have them in court, and paying for the costs of remediation. As for Wulfert Channel, that problem was created by the previous decision to reopen Blind Pass, done without regard for the foreseeable impact of shoreline erosion on the Sanibel side of the Pass.

All of this, including the increased vulnerability to storms and degradation of the island, is contrary to the supposed mission and purpose of the Sanibel Plan for the island's long term resiliency.

The bottom line is that fixing these problems, including restoration of the land barrier that separated Dinkins and Clam, is the City's responsibility.

I'm extremely disappointed that the dredging plan stops at Castaways and doesn't dredge out our property. There are four properties past Castaways that must be included in this project. Our property at 6498 Sanibel Captiva Road is one of them. We bought in 1995 and had a boat at our dock. All the renourishment of Captiva and Turner Beach, plus the storms have slowly silted in our property cutting off access to Blind Pass and the ability to navigate a boat from our dock to Castaways and out through Dinkins Bayou. Our 4 properties' have been the most severely impacted yet we have not been included in the dredging plan although we are being asked to pay. It doesn't make sense to not include our properties. 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Sanibel City Manager and City Council:

I am writing about a number of concerns we have about the proposed project. First and foremost, while it appears the City may be able to legally assess a small number of residents for the project, this is a public waterway that a large number of both residential and non-residential boaters will use and benefit from. This seems highly unfair to lay the burden of this cost on such a small number of residents. Unfortunately, your letter dated May 21, 2025 was the first time we and all of our neighbors became aware of the project even though it appears the project has been in progress for some time now. I would have expected that the impacted residents would have been contacted directly by the city for comment/concerns instead of it being buried in a city council meeting agenda and only being directly informed once the project has been approved. Since this is our first direct notice about the project and the fact that our property is included in the Assessment District we have a number of questions:

- Florida Statue 170 provides special assessments against the specific properties
   **benefiting** from the improvements. We would like to know exactly how you
   determined which properties will benefit from the project and please define the
   term"benefit" as used in the project. My wife and I do not own a boat and do not use
   the waterways in any way shape or form. So why are we being assessed for
   something we do not use nor benefit from and it appears clear from your letter
   that the dredging is necessary to "provide safe navigation for boaters". We do not fall
   into this class of beneficiaries.
- 2. Your letter states that the request was initiated by certain residents. We believe that there is a small number of very vocal residents who made the request. So we would like to know the approximate number of residents who made the request.

- **3.** We also want to know approximate number of residents that the City reached out to who reside in the Assessment District for their feed back on the project. Was there a poll, vote, survey, etc or was this project pushed through for the benefit of a very small number of people who can't get their large boats through the waterway? This project has the appearance of some type of a favor for a very few people at others expense.
- 4. We don't understand why this project is not being funded by the county, state or federal government given the fact that it is public waterway and due to natural disasters. Currently there is a project in progress to clean storm debris from these same waterways which we believe is being funded by Lee County. How is it that the county will pay to remove debris from the hurricanes but not the sand deposited in these public waterways.
- 5. It appears that the Assessment District only included properties located on the waterways and excludes those without direct access ("land locked") to the water. As you know, there are a number of boat ramps in these waterways that provide access to all boaters So why would you exclude anyone who boats.
- 6. Did council investigate any other means of funding this project such as grants, loans, assessments to all residents of Sanibel, etc.- if so, please provide responses received.
- 7. We do not understand how the City can establish a reserve against future work with in this small area does the city have reserves established for any other parts of the Island? This is not an HOA.
- **8.** We cannot determine exactly what parts of the waterways will actuall be dredged please provide a better map showing the project area and scope.

We look forward to your response.

As I stated above, that is totally untrue!!! Many of us will <u>not benefit at all</u>, and in addition, we will have some additional negatives!!

Please reevaluate this proposal. We do not need this dredging and don't want it, and the cost to us is enormous!!



Dear Council Members,

While the navigation issue may be real, we do not feel this SAD is the appropriate solution.

## We are writing to oppose the Special Assessment District as currently proposed.

- The notice period for this meeting agenda on June 3<sup>rd</sup> was way too short. Many affected residents did not receive this notice in time to prepare to comment in an informed manner.
- If you make an approximate count of the affected abuttors (i.e., those with boats large enough to encounter problems navigating the Dinkins Bayou entrance or Wulfert Channel) we feel that it will be a small percentage of the affected abuttors. Suppose it might be 40 users, yet another 160 abuttors are being asked to pay to solve this issue. We have personally navigated all the canals off Dinkins Bayou often, and while we have never counted the number of large draft boats, it is not enormous.
- One resident abutting Dinkins Bayou asserts that he has had no issues using a 28 ft. Dauntless in the waters.
- We have not received a copy of the legal reasoning whereby Sanibel decides that this is its problem.
- Wulfert Channel and Dinkins Bayou are Navigable Waters within the meaning of the act, and as such are the reponsibility of the USACE (US Army Corps of Engineers); please see sections of the US CFR attached.
- Abuttors are being asked/told to pay for work which will not benefit most of them; however, this dredging project will benefit many non-Sanibel residents, who will not be required to pay for any of ths work. This project is at a minimum one which should be funded by Lee County and the State, not by local residents of Sanibel.
- Mention is made of protecting property values of abuttors. Is protection of property value actually one of the responsibilities of the City of Sanibel?
- If a future claim is made by a boater alleging that the dredging is improperly done, will abuttors in the SAD be liable?
- Sanibel has experienced three hurricanes in three years. The waters of the Carribean and the Gulf of Mexico are warming so fast that hurricanes now develop independently in those seas, without having begun off the west coast of Africa. Two of those storms (Ian

and Milton) had enormous effects on the profiles of the Wulfert and Dinkins Bayou channels. The proposed 10 year planning horizon is meaningless when we contemplate that more such hurricanes are highly likely to occur within that horizon. What happens then? Will dredging be done sooner than 2035? Who will then pay for it?

- The last dredge of Blind Pass and part of the Wulfert Channel was in 2017. Following that there was a comprehensive, and very public, process to review the dredging template for future work. Those of us who participated provided input to the planning firm about the historic pattern of flows through Sunset Bay. When the firm ran their model with that modification, they found that adding to the dredging template to include Sunset Bay would significantly improve flows through Blind Pass.
- For those interested in the dredging history of Blind Pass, please visit this page.
- The last dredging was done for environmental reasons, not to improve navigation.
- The 2019 management plan in which many of us participated, is reported <u>here</u>. If you scroll down to page 10 of that report, you will see the final preferred option, Figure 5.
   That option would resolve whatever issues boaters may feel they now face.
- The current proposed dredging and funding is a short-sighted effort, with no apparent responses to a re-occurrence in a period less than the 10 year planning horizon. Meanwhile, abuttors are expected to pay an annual tax which will not suffice to respond to re-occurring storm changes. When this navigation problem happens again in 5 years, will the SAD feel obliged, or be allowed to make additional assessments?

We urge the Council to at a minimum table this project until answers to these points are more carefully researched. Fundamentally, this dredging should not be undertaken by the City of Sanibel when it so clearly benefits many users from other communities, and so few of the abuttors.

If the Council decides to proceed with this effort, then at a very bare minmum the affected abuttors should have the opportunity to vote on this proposal; to do otherwise amounts to taxation without representation.

## § 329.4 General definition.

Navigable waters of the United States are those waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible for use to transport interstate or foreign commerce. A determination of navigability, once made,

applies laterally over the entire surface of the waterbody, and is not extinguished by later actions or events which impede or destroy navigable capacity.

# § 329.7 Intrastate or interstate nature of waterway.

A waterbody may be entirely within a state, yet still be capable of carrying interstate commerce. This is especially clear when it physically connects with a generally acknowledged avenue of interstate commerce, such as the ocean or one of the Great Lakes, and is yet wholly within one state. Nor is it necessary that there be a physically navigable connection across a state boundary. Where a waterbody extends through one or more states, but substantial portions, which are capable of bearing interstate commerce, are located in only one of the states, the entirety of the waterway up to the head (upper limit) of navigation is subject to Federal jurisdiction.

# 329.12 Geographic and jurisdictional limits of oceanic and tidal waters.

(a) **Ocean and coastal waters.** The navigable waters of the United States over which Corps of Engineers regulatory jurisdiction extends include all ocean and coastal waters within a zone three geographic (nautical) miles seaward from the baseline (The Territorial Seas). Wider zones are recognized for special regulatory powers exercised over the outer continental shelf. (See <u>33 CFR 322.3(b)</u>).

Thank you for your letter regarding the potential assessment for dredging activities in waterways that fall under state or federal jurisdiction. We appreciate the city's effort to address long-standing concerns related to navigability and environmental conditions in these areas.

However, we would like to respectfully raise a concern regarding the proposed financial responsibility being placed on local waterfront residents for a project involving state or federal waterways. As these waterways are not privately owned and are under the regulatory authority of higher levels of government, it is unclear why local residents should bear the cost of a project that arguably serves a broader public interest—particularly when dredging may support commercial navigation, public safety, ecological restoration, or tourism.

We believe it would be more appropriate for the city to first seek support, funding, or costsharing agreements from the relevant state or federal agencies before considering local assessments.

We respectfully object to the ongoing tax to pay for future dredging. Having residents' money sit in your bank account obtaining interest doesn't seem right. No one can predict whether current residents will still be in their homes several years from now. Future dredging and its payment methodology should be addressed at that time.

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Hello,

I hope you're all well this Monday afternoon. My name is Nick Weyers and I live full time with my wife and 2 kids at 2540 Coconut Drive down by Blind Pass. I own a marine construction business (Santiva Marine Recovery) and run offshore fishing charters full time. To say that I'm familiar with Dinkins Bayou and that entire area, would be an understatement. I have physically walked most of Dinkins and Blind Pass in waders. My company was responsible for the waterway cleanup from Cayo Costa all the way down to the lighthouse. If you saw the barge and accompanying landing craft picking through the mangroves, that was us. I am in support of fixing the problem but, what is being presented is not a solution. I would love to help in any capacity that I can.

My concerns with this dredging project are many so I guess I'll just start listing them off while trying not to take up too much of your time.

- The area surveyed for the project does not include any areas that are preventing gulf access for Del Saga and half of the Sanctuary. The issue is much farther back in Dinkins bayou which would only affect residents on Pine Tree, not our neighborhood. The spot that blocks everyone in, isn't even on the survey map. It's in Blind pass.
- 2. Many residents, while thinking they need dredging, just need their boat slips blown out. Dinkins Bayou is navigable for any size boat that anyone has back there. I've driven massive boats back there with out any issue. Most of Dinkins has a depth of 4' or more. The Sand just moved with the past 2 storms and people don't know the route. I'd be happy show them or place markers to assist.
- 3. The real problem is in Blind Pass, not Dinkins Bayou. Where you come into Blind pass, the channel markers will force you to run aground. I have found another route that provides plenty of water until you get to the actual problem area. The area is about 20'x40' and is only restrictive

during low tide. That is the area that I brought up at a council meeting, nothing in Dinkins.

- 4. As you know, the beach renourishment project at Blind Pass is neverending. As more material is brought in to renourish that beach without there being anything to hold the sand there, or course it ends up in the channels and pass. One tropical storm and that sand is gone and piling up in the backbay where is has caused the channel to be unnavigable. In order to fix this problem, there is only one solution that makes sense to me and that is to mirror Captiva and build a jetty on our side to stop the sand from washing through the pass. It would allow the pass to open up more naturally and improve water quality dramatically for our end of the island and Captiva.
- 5. The environmental concerns for dredging Dinkins bayou is massive due to all the life that accumulates back there. There are oyster beds everywhere throughout Dinkins. There's an amazing amount of stone crabs and healthy fish populations that come back there. Dredging it would effectively turn it into a mudhole and kill any natural filtration we have.
- 6. The area that needs to be dredge in the pass has no seagrass or oysterbeds within it. It is truly just beach sand that piled up. This is not a \$3,000,000 fix. This is a job that one crew and an excavator can perform in about 4 days. The navigation markers should be moved to reflect the actual path through.
- 7. Correct me if I'm wrong but Dinkins and the pass are both naturally formed which would make them state waters and DEP territory. The city assessing us to fix a problem that is possibly out of it's jurisdiction seems problematic to me. I understand that Sanibel owns all the mad-made canals but the natural formations connected to the sound seem like state territory to me. But, if you're willing to help, we'll take it.
- 8. An assessment coming at this time of year when most of the residents down here are gone, has rubbed some people in a certain way. I can only speak for myself and friends in my neighborhood but we do not have an HOA and we like it that way. The idea that we can be assessed for a problem that was caused by a project that wasn't completed in the correct manor by the city is problematic. As section 4 points out, this was 100% caused by the beach renourishment and anyone that lives down here full time, saw it happen in real time. While we appreciate your attention to maintaining our beach, I view it as a massive waste of time and funds until there is a jetty at the bridge. And to shift 66% of the cost to the neighborhood doesn't feel right considering the cause of the problem. As many who came before us, there's no sense is doing a job if it's not going to be done right. \$3,000,000 for a one-time permanent solution, we're all open to that. \$3,000,000 for a band-aid that will fall off in a year

doesn't seem like a good idea and opens up a whole can of worms down the road.

In closing I just wanted to offer my experience and assistance with anything moving forward. Whether that be having my crew dig it out or donating my time to show the necessary people where the issues lie, I'm at your disposal. I intend to attend the meeting tomorrow to voice my concerns both to you and the public in person. I look forward to finding a real solution to this issue and working together to make sure our island stays special. Feel free to call at any time with questions.

Dear Council Members,

A quick review of Coconut Drive residents shows we never received your mailing regarding the dredging project and assessment. Did you miss a street? Or are you intentionally providing us with too short a time to respond to this proposal? Was it mailed so we would receive it after the meeting? Are you trying to push this through illegally without proper notice? Is there an under-the-table reason for your urgency, similar to what South Seas attempted? Are you behaving like Lee County in this rushed project?

It is rumored that this project is at the special request of only a few of our residents who have deep-water boats; again, comparisons can be drawn between the South Seas and Lee County situation.

The general feeling is that the Sanibel City Council and the City of Sanibel do not have the interests of the West End at heart and that you show favoritism toward the East End. For instance, the City's payment for the Periwinkle bridge is a prime example. That bridge is unnecessary, as the East End can be accessed via Lindgren and East Gulf Drive. It should not be paid for by the City of Sanibel. You are demonstrating favoritism. Comments were made on the bridge favoritism before learning of the dredging project.

A large portion of the boaters using Wulfurt Channel are not residents of our neighborhood. In fact, we must keep a watch to ensure these boaters do not come ashore and steal from us. My neighbors and I must lock up everything to prevent theft. Nothing is safe. Therefore, we do not want to dredge the channel to aid and abet thieves.

I recall the rational and reasonable concerns of larger boat owners regarding the ability of any boats to exit and make a right turn towards the Bay into the blind pass strait from Dinkins. Now, I believe the cost to address that area, which absolutely needs to be dredged for anything larger than a canoe to use, is \$50,000. However, it seems that the only area not scheduled for dredging is that very location. The only other "terrible" areas, in my opinion, are the far end of Pine Tree and Sunset Bay (although Sunset needs to be reopened at the Bridge, as it was until Charlie, to allow for proper flushing). Previously, that dredging was part of a city/county/Federal project intended to dredge Blind Pass in 2026 without assessments. I'm attaching the plans below, but it may be a jurisdictional issue, and the County must dredge the affected area necessary to escape Dinkins Bayou while the City thinks it's helping.

While the navigation issue may be real, we do not feel this SAD is the appropriate solution.

#### We are writing to oppose the Special Assessment District as currently proposed.

- The notice period for this meeting agenda on June 3<sup>rd</sup> was way too short. Many affected residents did not receive this notice in time to prepare to comment in an informed manner.
- If you perform an approximate count of the affected abuttors (i.e., those with boats large enough to encounter problems navigating the Dinkins Bayou entrance or Wulfert Channel), we believe that it will represent a small percentage of the affected abuttors. Let's say it might be 40 users, yet another 160 abuttors are being asked to pay to resolve this issue. We have frequently navigated all the canals off Dinkins Bayou, and while we have never counted the number of large-draft boats, it is not considerable.One resident abutting Dinkins Bayou asserts that he has had no issues using a 28 ft. Dauntless in the waters.
- We have not received a copy of the legal reasoning by which Sanibel determines that this is its problem.
- Wulfert Channel and Dinkins Bayou are navigable waters as defined by the act, and are therefore the responsibility of the USACE (US Army Corps of Engineers); please see the attached sections of the US CFR.
- Abutters are being asked or told to pay for work that will not benefit most of them. However, this dredging project will benefit many non-Sanibel residents, who will not be required to cover any of this work. This project should, at a minimum, be funded by Lee County and the State, not by local residents of Sanibel.
- If a future claim is made by a boater alleging that the dredging was done improperly, will the abutters in the SAD be liable?
- Sanibel has experienced three hurricanes in three years. The waters of the Caribbean
  and the Gulf of Mexico are warming so rapidly that hurricanes now develop
  independently in those seas, without originating off the west coast of Africa. Two of
  those storms (Ian and Milton) had significant effects on the profiles of the Wulfert and
  Dinkins Bayou channels. The proposed 10-year planning horizon is meaningless when we
  consider that more such hurricanes are likely to occur within that period. What happens
  then? Will dredging be done before 2035? Who will pay for it?
- The last dredging of Blind Pass and part of the Wulfert Channel occurred in 2017. Following that, there was a comprehensive and very public process to review the dredging template for future work. Those of us who participated provided input to the planning firm regarding the historic pattern of flows through Sunset Bay. When the firm ran their model with that modification, they discovered that expanding the dredging template to include Sunset Bay would significantly improve flows through Blind Pass.
- For those interested in the dredging history of Blind Pass, please visit this page.

- The last dredging was done for environmental reasons, not to improve navigation.
- The 2019 management plan in which many of us participated, is reported here. If you scroll down to page 10 of that report, you will see the final preferred option, Figure 5. That option would resolve any issues that boaters may feel they currently face.
- The current proposed dredging and funding efforts are short-sighted, lacking any apparent strategies to address a recurrence within a period shorter than the 10-year planning horizon. Meanwhile, property owners are expected to pay an annual tax that will not be sufficient to respond to recurring storm changes. When this navigation problem arises again in 5 years, will the SAD feel obliged or be permitted to make additional assessments?

We urge the Council to, at a minimum, table this project until the answers to these points are researched more thoroughly. Fundamentally, this dredging should not be undertaken by the City of Sanibel, especially when it clearly benefits many users from other communities and so few of the abuttors.

If the Council decides to proceed with this effort, then at the very least the affected abuttors should have the opportunity to vote on this proposal; to do otherwise amounts to taxation without representation.

#### § 329.4 General definition.

Navigable waters of the United States are those waters that are subject to the ebb and flow of the tide and/or are presently used, or have been used in the past, or may be susceptible for use to transport interstate or foreign commerce. A determination of navigability, once made, applies laterally over the entire surface of the waterbody, and is not extinguished by later actions or events which impede or destroy navigable capacity.

#### § 329.7 Intrastate or interstate nature of waterway.

A waterbody may be entirely within a state, yet still be capable of carrying interstate commerce. This is especially clear when it physically connects with a generally acknowledged avenue of interstate commerce, such as the ocean or one of the Great Lakes, and is yet wholly within one state. Nor is it necessary that there be a physically navigable connection across a state boundary. Where a waterbody extends through one or more states, but substantial portions, which are capable of bearing interstate commerce, are located in only one of the states, the entirety of the waterway up to the head (upper limit) of navigation is subject to Federal jurisdiction.

#### 329.12 Geographic and jurisdictional limits of oceanic and tidal waters.

(a) **Ocean and coastal waters.** The navigable waters of the United States over which Corps of Engineers regulatory jurisdiction extends include all ocean and coastal waters within a zone three geographic (nautical) miles seaward from the baseline (The Territorial Seas). Wider zones are recognized for special regulatory powers exercised over the outer continental shelf. (See <u>33 CFR 322.3(b)</u>).

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Dear Vicki and Members of City Council:

I currently reside at 6012 White Heron Lane and am writing to you to strongly support the proposed dredging plan for Wulfert Channel and related tax assessment zone. As you may know, I have been one of the residents who has worked with the City Manager and City Staff to develop this plan and I truly believe it represents the best solution for the serious navigation issues we are facing as well as improve water flow and related environmental conditions in the bayou. I won't belabor the points for supporting, others in the community I know have it far better than I could have in emails to you.

From where I sit-based on numerous emails, phone calls and meetings-the communities surrounding Dinkins strongly support the the dredging and assessment zone plans. There are, however, some that do not. Their objections include:

- 1. My boat can currently get through the problem so I don't want to pay;
- 2. These waterways are the responsibility of the Federal, State and County governments so we shouldn't be taxed by the City for this;
- 3. Homeowners on Captiva that have to use Wulfert Channel to get out should have to contribute;
- 4. We shouldn't have our taxes raised by the City;
- 5. The dredging plan does not cover the problem areas, and the the problem areas are smaller than the plan calls for; if the channel markers are correctly placed the area in question is much smaller.
- 6. The dredging plan is too expansive in the bayou and not needed.
- 7. The problem is caused by the beach renourishment projects on Captiva and Sanibel, and the lack of a jetty on the Sanibel side. This does nothing to fix that.

Some of these objections obviously don't deserve a response (and some of those have been made by people with other agendas-they are trying to sell their houses right now and don't want an assessment). With respect to other objections, we have tried our best to educate the communities that it is, unfortunately, the City's responsibility to deal with these waterways. As you might expect, some don't want to hear that. However, we all would like to see the City push the County for some reimbursement for the Captiva residents' "share", or work with the county to establish a wider tax assessment zone that includes those residents. We recognize that this is part of a longer term solution and should not affect the approval before you.

The dredging plan is comprehensive; if minor adjustments need to be made before the actual dredge because of shifting bottoms that should not be an issue. However, we residents feel strongly that the size of the area in Wulfert to be dredged is appropriate. We hit bottom all over that area right now when it is lower than mean tide and this plan solves that issue. I'm sure an expert guide who is on the water everyday can navigate through the eye of a needle but for the vast majority of us that is not the case.

The objectors are right, this plan doesn't solve what many many residents over the last couple of decades believe, that beach renourishment and lack of a jetty are the causes of all of this. But we need to fix the current problem and tackle that problem at the same time.

I am sorry I cannot be at the Meeting Tuesday, I will be travelling to Ireland for a work matter. Thank you for your strong leadership on this issue, this solution helps everyone and makes for a better Sanibel.









- Areas of no change are shown in green














